My BIG discovery...

A romantic subplot...

Gives your characters *personal stakes*
beyond survival or victory.

A romantic subplot...

Enhances your *story's themes*, whether they're about identity, freedom, or survival.

A romantic subplot...

Creates *tension*, forcing your characters to make hard choices between love and duty.

We'll focus on:

**3 Steps to Blend Romance
(*without* losing the sci-fi edge)**

Step 1: Ground the Romance in Human Emotion

Love is Universal

- Make the love story relatable, whether your characters are on a distant planet or in a parallel universe.
- Use romance to connect your readers to your characters on a personal level.
- Example: *The Adjustment Bureau* – David's love for Elise keeps him grounded in a world controlled by fate.

EXAMPLE



Step 2: Balance Action and Intimacy

Romance and Action Aren't Mutually Exclusive

- Intimacy can break up action, allowing your readers to catch their breath while deepening character relationships.
- Don't be afraid to slow down the pace for a heartfelt moment.
- Example: *Battleship* – Alex's relationship with Samantha adds personal stakes and motivates his character arc.

Step 3: Raise the Stakes

Romance Makes *Every* Conflict Personal

- Personal stakes make the larger conflict more impactful.
- Your characters must choose between their heart and their mission, adding tension.
- Example: *World War Z* – Gerry's love for his family drives his mission to save the world.



EXAMPLE



Recap

- Step 1: Ground the Romance in Human Emotion – Make the love story relatable, no matter how futuristic the world is.
- Step 2: Balance Action and Intimacy – Use romance as a breather between high-octane scenes to deepen emotional engagement.
- Step 3: Raise the Stakes – Love adds personal risk, forcing your characters to face dilemmas that make them human.



Does the romance enhance the main character's arc?

- How does the romantic subplot influence or complement the protagonist's development?
- Does the romance challenge the protagonist to grow, change, or confront their internal struggles?

What conflict or tension does the romance create?

- What internal or external obstacles stand in the way of the characters' romantic relationship?
- How does the romantic tension affect the main plot? Does it complicate the protagonist's primary goals?

Is the romance subplot integral to the main plot, or tacked on?

- Does the romantic relationship meaningfully impact the direction or outcome of the main plot?
- Would the story remain largely the same if the romance subplot were removed? If so, how can it be more integrated?
